During the Edwardian decade, Ketèlbey remained a fairly shadowy figure. He began it as a jobbing conductor of shows around the country, including his own opera *The Wonder Worker*. He ended it conducting in music halls. Though he settled down to marriage and a regular job with Columbia Graphophone, I have not found these documented in contemporary newspapers. Only a handful of his compositions were performed regularly. - TMcC

This selection of articles omits repeated adverts, and also most references to concert programmes which merely list works performed without any value judgement.

He at once established himself a prime favourite by his magnificent rendering of Ketelby's pretty song, "Aberfoyle"; Mr. David had selected a song which afforded him plenty of score in which to display his abilities, and it may unhesitatingly be said of him that he is one of the very best of the many fine tenors who have delighted Wycombe audiences. ...

Ketelbey entitled "Aberfoyle," with success...

Buckingham Advertiser and Free Press, Saturday 29th July 1905 **BROOK HALL SCHOOL, ANNUAL PRIZE DISTRIBUTION**.

... On returning to the Schoolroom, the programme was resumed as follows ...

The pupils had during the programme been seated on the stage, attired in white dresses with light blue sashes. And now followed a floral cantata, "The Garland" (by Albert Ketèlbey) by eight of the pupils attired in Brittany costumes, of coloured skirts, with apron and fichu of white and starched caps, and carrying bouquets of flowers. The characters were: Margot (1st soprano), M. Wood; Christine (2nd soprano), C. Kibble; Village Maidens, N. Wood, G. Jones, E. Ward, E. Hughes, L. Dancer, and W. Price.

It is not only an exceedingly pretty piece, but also very pretty and pleasing in its theme. Briefly stated the girls meet and discuss the coming La Fête des Torses which is to be held in a little town of Brittany, when a prize is to be offered for the pretty garland of flowers. Margot and Christine, two rival beauties of the village, have each seen, and coveted for their garland, a starry flower growing high among the rocks. Margot desires the prize to buy luxuries for her invalid sister, and Christine overcoming her jealousy, dares the danger of the ascent of the mountain, and brings the flower to Margot, thus enabling her to win the prize.

The singing was extremely good throughout; indeed, the whole rendering of the piece gave evidence of very careful training, the solos and duet of the principal girls at the close being full of pathos, especially when the coveted flower, for the gaining of which the girl had risked her life, is handed over by her to her rival, for the benefit of the invalid sister...

Derby Daily Telegraphy, Tuesday 7th November 1905 **HAPPY SATURDAY EVENINGS.**

The Happy Saturday Evening preceding the society's anniversary is always a special one. The Temperance Hall was filled on Saturday, the great attraction being a return visit from the "Merrie Peasants," a very talented company [in fact a vocal quartet] ... The programme was as follows: Opening chorus (Ketelbey) Ye Merrie Peasants; ...song, "Aberfoyle" (Ketelbey), Mr. Trefelyn David ... [The chorus was repeated the following year with no further identification, but may refer to the opening chorus of *The Wonder Worker*. This group of Welsh singers had also performed it at St James' Hall (Kingston upon Thames?), as reported in *Surrey Comet*, 18th October 1905]

Although without octaves and presumably intended for small hands, Anton Vodorinski's "Bluette", by reason of its legato passages, necessitates fingers and wrists well under control, which are herein provided with an ingenious piece of writing producing good results from small means.

To graceful lines by Florence Hoare the composer has wedded equally graceful and expressively truthful music, which, while technically excellent, is capable of affording pleasure to audiences of average musical taste. Vocalists will no doubt find such songs especially welcome. Tenors – to whom the song will make its most urgent appeal – have too few of such songs in their repertoire.

... A batch of new songs yield several of more than passing interest. A.W. Ketelbey's "My heart adream" is a superior ballad of the type that tenors affect...

Manchester Courier and Lancashire General Advertiser, Wednesday 18th August 1909 NEW MUSIC. SONGS & INSTRUMENTAL PIECES.

... "My Heart a-Dream," by Albert W. Ketélbey, should be effective enough with a not too critical audience; it has a passage marked "molto appassionato", and it ends "allargando" on fortissimo chords. Surely nothing more is required by the ballad singer of to-day!

Cheltenham Looker-On, Saturday 4th September 1909 **SONGS**

..."My heart a-dream," by Albert W. Ketelbey (Novello & Co., Ltd.). – It would be difficult to find real inspiration for such words; still the composer has succeeded in writing some good music. The voice part is vocal and the accompaniment grateful to play.

Lancashire Evening Post, Friday 15th October 1909 **VILLAGE SCHOOL CHOIRS**

... The first prize went to Wrea Green School Choir, conducted by Mrs T.H. Myles, which has already a reputation in the Fylde. The test piece was Ketelby's two-part song, "Come o'er the Woodland." The pace of the Wrea Green choir was brisk, the adjudicator said, and perhaps a shade hurried, but

it was extremely pretty as rhythm. All the little dainty accents were excellent use of. It seemed to be no trouble for the choir to sing. They were awarded 75 marks...
